Types of bullying:

- **Physical** intentionally inflicting physical harm to a person / group of people. It can also include stealing or damaging personal property.
- **Verbal** deliberate & continuous name calling directed at a student / group of students, designed to humiliate or insult.
- Written intentionally writing insulting remarks about someone/group of people in a public place. This also includes passing notes & drawing images of another person, graffiti, etc.
- Extortion obtaining something through forceful means, e.g. blackmail
- **Exclusion** this occurs when a student / students is deliberately and repeatedly left out of a group / activity, etc.
- Relational damaging the relationship one shares with others.
- Online otherwise known as cyberbullying. This type of bullying is carried out through technical devices, text, DMs & social media platforms, gaming consoles, chatrooms, etc.
 - ***If a message is posted online, just on one occasion it can be considered bullying behaviour, as it is intended to be shared multiple times & seen by many.

A Telling Culture:

Please tell someone if you think that you or someone else is being bullied.

If a student tells a staff member that S think they are being bullied, we will:

Talk with the student

- ask the student what they want to happen
- work out a plan together
- talk to their parents
- Talk to the other student(s) involved
- talk with the other student's parents
